but the problem persists:  
Lithuanian letters are in:

1. ISO-8859-13
  2. ISO-8859-4
  3. windows-1257 encodings, but none of them are supported as charsets, and error message still persists.
- I have tried all encodings, that are supported by php in htmlentities but none of them recognizes Lithuanian letters.

Maybe there is possibility to use diferent encoding, but not with htmlentities?

All ideas are very welcome.

Tom, you have to use the text editor that supports UTF-8 encoding. Works fine fine for me. I use Macromedia Dreamweaver MX (CTRL+J to change charset), but I am sure there are other software packs for this.
